As the sun rises over the beautiful white sand beaches of Ft. Walton Beach. Florida on October 3, 2003, a bunch of Vietnam Veterans arrive from as far away as Washington State to spend the next three days with their comrades. These are the daring men who flew and maintained the post WWII cargo planes converted to side firing gunships. The ugly twin boom C-119 played many roles in the Air Force. Fifty-two of these cargo/ paratrooper flying machines would play an entirely new role in late sixties. Twenty-six C-119G's were converted to AC-119G's with a compliment of four 7.62 Mini-guns. Twenty-six more were converted to AC-119K's with the 4 miniguns plus 2 20MM Gatling Guns. The G model was called the Shadow and the K's became known as the Stinger. The first G's were flown and maintained by reservists of 71st SOS and then turned over to the 17th SOS. The K's were all assigned to the 18th SOS. These Squadrons flew from 1968 to 1973 when all were turned over to the South Vietnamese Air Force.

It took the majority of the crews and maintainers thirty some years to locate other members and to form the AC-119 Gunship Association. I don't know about the rest of the guys, but the day I found the Web Site, was just about the most exciting and emotional day of my life.

The first Reunion of AC-119 Gunshippers was held in September of 2000. It is not required that a person join the Association in order to attend the Reunions. However, to date, we have over 235 members, with over 125 of that number being Life Members.

This year was very special in that we located and invited families of our "killed in combat" crew members. Members of the families were made life members and presented with the numbered brass life membership cards. We are looking and hope to find family members of all eighteen of our KIA.

This and the previous three Reunions have been held in Ft. Walton Beach. Next year we will hold our Reunion in Dayton, Ohio at the Air Force Museum, we will get our aircraft into the history of the Air Force. We hope to have even more of our Gunship Brothers and families there. Hello Gunshippers, how can you top RE-UNION IV?? Gus, Wayne, Ray, Art, and the other "helpers" did an OUTSTANDING JOB at Ft. Walton Beach for our Association. WE ALL THANK YOU!! Those of you in attendance can attest to that fact.

The Memorial Service and the Plaque Dedication brought many remembrances of our fallen aircrew members. Those family members we were able to locate and then those that chose to attend the reunion, all said they did not realize that we still carried their loved ones in our hearts, as well. The "Guest book" Thank You entry from Teddi Alves says it all.

The AC-130 Static Display at Hurlburt Field was a great opportunity again. I have missed that part of the Reunions since the events of 9/11. While there, I was able to visit at length with the Co-pilot, Flight Engineer, Loadmaster, and Electronic Warfare Officer about their respective duties and recent flight experiences. I now know, even with the unsavory press the military receives, WE ARE IN GOOD HANDS! The dedication, knowledge, work ethic, and desire of those young people was very apparent. It was hard for me to believe the Air Force would give a "bunch of 15 year olds" an airplane of that nature. I feel certain that after we left, they might have said, "Is that what we are going to look like in 30 years??" Thank You for the opportunity to go onboard the aircraft.

General Metcalf's presentation at the Reunion Dinner gave each of us aircrew members an opportunity to see the "not so glamorous" side of the flying game. The problems related to being a "Tenant Unit" on base, and having to beg, borrow, salvage, and steal parts to keep the old bird in the air. If it had not been for the dedication, creativity, and willingness of the "wrench turners" to work long and hard on aircraft, that were probably older than they were, we would not have been able to make our missions. We are forever grateful for your efforts and those of the maintenance teams that let RTB (return to base), and ultimately back to the "world".

About your Newsletter Editor

I am Everett Dale Sprous, the Editor of "The Firing Circle". The official Newsletter of the AC-119 Gunship Association.

I began my Air Force career in 1963, at the age of 17. I had always loved airplanes and decided the Air Force was the place for me. I became a Security Policeman, and never saw a plane for my first four years.

I got out after four years and stayed out for over a year. In 1968, I decided I wanted back in. The Recruiter was very anxious to have a prior service guy, and said I could choose any career field I wanted. I chose Aerial Photography but he said that field was closed. My next choice was Weapons Mechanic, which was maintaining the weapons systems of fighter aircraft. I could at least be around aircraft, though my greatest desire was to fly.

My Tech School was at Lowry AFB, Colorado. From there to Luke AFB, Arizona for advance training on F100's. Next was my first tour of Vietnam. I was assigned to the F100 Squadrons at Bien Hoa AB, Vietnam.

From Nam, I was assigned to Travis AFB, California, as an POL Specialist (gas pumper). I wanted very much to get back in the Weapons field. My chance came within a few months, when someone told me that the AF was looking for ex weapons personnel to train as Gunners. Not only would I get back in weapons, I would also get to fly.

I had no idea what I would fly on and I didn't care. I just knew I was finally going to get off the ground. I went through all my training, air chamber at Castle, Flight training at Hurlburt, Survival at Fairchild and Jungle School at Clark.

I then found my orders had been changed from Phan Rang, Vietnam to NKP, Thailand. Great, I would not have to fly over Vietnam. I soon learned that the areas we were to fly over, were sometimes worse than Nam. I did go TDY to Bien Hoa in early 1972.

After Nam, I was assigned to Italy. My job there was to watch Italian Airmen load Nukes on F-105's. That was a great tour.

From Italy, I went to Laughlin AFB, Texas, where I cross trained into the computer field.

I ended my career after 13 years, thinking I could get out and make better money as a civilian in computers. I did make good money, but I wished I would have finished my 20 years.

I searched every magazine and veteran paper I could find, in hopes of seeing something about the Gunships. Finally, in 2001, I started hitting keys on my computer. At long last, after 29 years of searching, I found the AC-119 Gunship Association.

I went to my first reunion in 2001, which was the second reunion for the Association. I came away feeling depressed as I felt like an outsider and didn't remember hardly anyone.

I started thinking when I got back, that I hadn't seen a Newsletter published by the Association. I then emailed some members of the Board and expressed my willingness to publish a Newsletter for the group. I was told to go for it and the result is what you see now. With the help of Bill Petrie, I was able to produce a desirable Newsletter. The title "The Firing Circle" came from Larry (DOC) Fletcher. After conferring with the Board, everyone felt this was an appropriate title for our Newsletter. With this issue we have produced four Newsletters since Reunion II.

Getting involved was the best thing that ever happened since finding my Brothers. By Reunion III, everyone was saying great "Newsletter EV", keep up the good work. I still can't remember half of the men I flew and worked with, but I have many new friends (BROTHERS). I look forward to each and every Reunion as a new adventure.

I have also taken on the membership duties. We now have a new policy for membership. Instead of memberships running from reunion to reunion, they now go from the date that a person signs up for one year. I send out renewal notices about one month before the expiation date of your membership. I also order the Brass Life Cards. Along with Brass Card, life members also get a laminated paper card.

Families of those we are here to honor today AC- 119 gunship association members and guests

Thank you. It is my great honor to be a part of this memorial today.

The military is intertwined with tradition – for us, it binds us to our past - One of valor, service and sacrifice. It is the source of our pride, our honor and instills the conviction to prevail when the odds are against us. No tradition is more sacred than the honor we give our fallen.

Today on these – our hallowed grounds. We honor these men who made the ultimate sacrifice supporting AC-119 combat operations in south east Asia.

They went into harms way knowing - there could be no triumph without loss - no victory without suffering - no freedom without sacrifice. And still they answered their nation's call to arms - All gave some – some gave all.

In remembering - we reopen old wounds. Yet, It's right that we remember, and even that we mourn for our fallen heroes. In doing so we fulfill that sacred pledge we make to every solider, sailor and airmen who goes to war – to never forget the sacrifices they made for us all.

The AC-119 association and others like it help us keep that solemn promise. For those we honor today and for those still in harms way today - I thank you.

Failure is not an option. 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Five Year Milestone for AC-119 Gunship Website

This month marks the five year anniversary of our website. With more than 90,000 hits to the website, our presence on the World Wide Web continues to prove invaluable in collecting and preserving AC-119 gunship history as well as inform members about reunions, Association activities, and the recruitment of new members. The website not only enables us to tell our "little-known" story about our involvement in the Vietnam War, it enables us to rekindle friendships with those we served with, their families, and those we flew to protect.

With no prior knowledge of Hypertext Markup Language (HTML) 5 web pages were developed over a "pull-your-hair-out" weekend in October 1998 (now you know why I'm bald). Initially, website hosting fees and seed money were provided by the webmaster and then by donations of fellow Gunshippers who learned of the website. The generosity of our brothers brought our site to life and they have kept it alive for the past five years. Those initial funds are now depleted but it was enough for a great five-year maiden voyage of *ac-119gunships.com*.

AC-119gunships.com has evolved into the Official Website of the AC-119 Gunship Association. Now, the AC-119 Gunship Association will fund the site on a yearly basis. Normal site expenses run approximately \$300 for website hosting and two domain name registrations. Website management is accomplished using Macromedia's Dreamweaver4 (soon to be Dreamweaver MX2004) for HTML coding and web page design and lavout: Adobe Photoshop7 for processing and posting photos; and Microsoft Word to write and edit content and stories. The Association also voice voted approval to purchase software for volunteers to assist in their duties updating the website. This software, Macromedia's Contribute, will cost approximately \$400 for 5 licenses The software is still under review so more on that later. To date, no Association money has been spent on software or hardware for the web site.

The *ac-119gunships.com* website continues to be a part-time; after work; late in the evening; in between honey-do's project for your webmaster....It has become a labor of love.

The site's impressive growth, as well as the wealth of photos and other material needing to be readied for posting, created quite a burden on the webmaster. With that in mind, a call went out during the 2003 general meeting for Project Volunteers to assist with various areas of the web site. During that meeting the following brave souls stepped up to the plate (or should I say computer) and volunteered:

Project Volunteer to track deceased mem bers & update the Final Flight list and to contact family members of those we lost in Southeast Asia.

Larry (Doc) Fletcher

Project Volunteer to research and/or to locate additional AC-119 gunship info and fine-tune, authenticate, and verify information already posted on the site, to include the 17th & 18th Special Operations Squadrons, their equipment, and operations for use on the website and any print material.

Dan McDuffie and Duane Hampshire

Project Volunteer to assist photo processing for the site. This position needed strong Adobe Photoshop skills, or the ability to use another program compatible with or comparable to Photoshop.

Craig Corbett and Doc Fletcher

Project Volunteer to edit and prepare stories for web. This volunteer must know Microsoft Word and be a good proofreader

Thank you again to the above project officers who stepped forward. Your assistance will greatly enhance and speed up web site management.
