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Reunion Update Continued

Our first optional tour will be an all day outing to the beautiful Texas Hill Country on Thursday, 26 September. During this tour, we'll focus on Fredericksburg, a quaint historical German community. You'll be free to have lunch (on your own) at a wide variety of local restaurants. During your visit you can enjoy shopping and browsing at quaint gift boutiques, antique shops on Main Street; Sample Hill Country wines (a tasting fee may apply): or visit the National Museum of the Pacific War which includes the Admiral Nimitz Museum, George Bush Gallery of the Pacific War, Plaza of the Presidents, Japenese Garden of Peace. Memorial Walk and the Pacific Combat Zone. Next, you'll travel to the LBJ Ranch. where National and State Historic Parks tell the story of our 36th President — From his ancestors to his final resting place. You can also tour LBJ's Texas White House. Basic tour fee is \$35. Additional admission fees for the National Museum is \$8 and LBJ's White house fee is \$3.

Thursday evening, enjoy an optional dinner at one of San Antonio's exceptional Mexican Restaurants.(Sign up sheets will be in the hootch).

Our second optional tour will be a half-day tour, Friday morning, to visit some of San Antonio's historic and cultural sites. First, we'll visit two historic Spanish Missions along the San Antonio River – Mission Conception (the oldest un-restored stone church in the USA) and Mission San Jose ("Queen of the Missions" – the largest San Antonio mission; almost fully restored). From there we'll go to the San Fernando Cathedral (the oldest standing church building in Texas).

The final stop will be at Market Square (or El Mercado) which features working artists and the largest Mexican market north of the Rio Grande.

Friday night, we'll kick off our traditional reunion events, starting with our Welcome Reception. Saturday morning, we'll have our Association and spouses' meetings, and Saturday evening we'll have our annual Association Banquet featuring a sax quartet and vocalist from the *AF Band of the West* (Lackland), a brief presentation by Colonel Ron Terry, and our annual Association Awards and Raffle

Sunday morning golfers hit the links, and Sunday evening we'll close with our traditional BBQ.

Danang's Stinger Ops Logo

Where did it come from?

as told by (at the time) Sgt Tom Graham

Many of you assigned to the 18th Special Operations Squadron at Danang Air base will remember "The Stinger Logo on the Ops Building at Danang" But not many knew who painted it. Yup! It was me, Tom Graham.

In 1969, I finished my five level in the 42350 electrical career field at Perrin AFB near Sherman TX, which allowed me to work without supervision. When they closed Perrin AFB, I was sent to Luke AFB to the FTD school on the F-100 – enroute to Vietnam.

After arriving in Vietnam in May 1970, I was stationed at Phan Rang. I spent my first week in the transit barracks which had been hit by mortars two days before. My first combat was a battle with the mosquitos.

I was assigned to the F-100 electric shop but I guess they

had all the electricians they needed, so I was sent to the electric shop that maintained the 119G Shadow and 119K Stinger gunships. After working on T-33, F-102 and T-37 I was glad to get to work on something with room to work.

Two months later they moved a number of gunships to Saigon and they volunteered me to go with them. That was about July 1970. Saigon was a learning experience. I guess there

was a big move by the North Vietnamese and they moved a number of 119s to Saigon because of that. There was always TIC (Troops-in-Contact) missions going on at night, and when they landed it was all hands on board - when the birds came everyone helped out to get quick turn arounds.

I learned how to load ammo and support the ground crew wherever needed. At least the nights went by fast. There are a lot of good memories from the thirty days I spent there. I spent another month back at Phan Rang and then on to Danang where I was technically assigned to the electric shop for

F-4s. Although I was supposed to work out of the F-4 shop, they didn't know the 119s and I didn't know the F-4, so they put me in with the other AC-119 maintenance personnel across from the flight crew hootch. I was glad to learn that I wouldn't be wasting my knowledge of the 119K while trying to learn the F-4s. I was placed in the maintenance hootch with the gun plumbers, electronic techs, and other maintenance staff.

It was sometime in late 1970 or early '71 when someone wanted a logo painted on the flight line. I don't know if Doug Metcalf requested it or the first sergeant. I put in the order for the paint and other supplies, and away I went.

The first one looked more like a crab than a scorpion.

About a month later a request came from the commander to paint another one on the "Ops" building on Gun Fighter Row. Seems like there were several logos on that building.


Between the time I finished the one on the maintenance building at the flight line I was able to see the "real" squadron mascot – a huge, black, Asian Scorpion someone had acquired and kept in the First Sergeant's (Stinger Ops Logo continued)

room. I believe the scorpion was nicknamed "Herbie."

A short time later I made changes to the Operations building logo which reflected the scorpion mascot a lot better.

As that famous Oklahoman Paul Harvey often said, "And now you know... the rest of the story....."

Old Nav Wings Shine Again!

Captain Rod Slagle was the Table Navigator and one of three crewmembers lost on Stinger 41 when it was shot down while defending An Loc on May 2, 1972. Life finally went on for Barbara Barker (Rod's wife) and their daughter Traycee, and a few years ago Barbara decided to put together



about Rod's career for her three Grandkids, Kylie, Kendall, and Cole. She contacted a local Shadowbox maker, George Charette, who was intrigued with Barbara's plans and Rod's service.
